Sunday, August 30, 10:30 am – "*The Value of Awareness*"- As our children gear up to go back to school, Mary Warwick will present concepts written in a commencement speech originally presented by David Foster Wallace.

Sunday, September 6, 10:30 am - *"Annual Potluck Picnic Lunch" --* Murrysville's **Bear Hollow Park**. Bring a dish to share, plates and flatware. There is a playground and a stream for the children to play in. Grills/charcoal will be provided.

Fiscal Year 2009 Report

News from the Treasurer

Following is summary financial data for fiscal year ending 6/30/09:

Liquid assets, 6/30/09: \$ 6,953.18

Increase (decrease) in liquid assets: \$ 2,642.04

Net inflows: \$ 2,642.04

Prepaid mortgage funds, 6/30/09: \$12,327.08

Mortgage principal balance, 6/30/09: \$27.743.32

In August, Marianne Jew (your new treasurer) and I will begin the process of implementing a web-based church accounting system called "Icon." To simplify the conversion, we may end up sending you two separate donation statements for the tax year: one for January – June (from the old system) and another for July – December (from the new system). Keep in mind that while the tax year runs from January 1 - December 31, our fiscal year runs from July 1 - June 30.

I'm grateful to those of you who begin to pay your new fiscal year pledge during the old fiscal year, but it's difficult to track pledge progress when payments are received outside of the current fiscal year. For those of you who made 2009-2010 pledge payments prior to July 1, I've booked those donations to the 2008-2009 fiscal year, and will reduce the amount of your 2009-2010 pledge accordingly. For example, if you pledged \$500 for 2009-2010, but paid \$100 of it 5/31/09 (before the new fiscal year actually started), I'll reduce your 2009-2010 pledge to \$400, and credit you with a \$100 overpayment for 2008-2009. Ultimately, you'll still receive proper tax credit for anything you contribute.

Thanks also to those who made donations toward our UUA dues. We were able to raise an additional \$684 over and above the \$500 I had sent them earlier. Unfortunately, we didn't meet our "fair share" commitment of \$3,360. The UUA needed to receive our donation by no later than 7/1, so I mailed our check 6/24. Any UUA-specific donations received after that date have been applied to your 2008-2009 pledge and will be used to pay general operating expenses.

This will be my final newsletter column at treasurer. It has been my privilege to serve ESUUC as treasurer. I'll remain as assistant treasurer for another year. We'll be looking for a new assistant treasurer to start next July to ultimately succeed Marianne Jew as treasurer. In this way, we ensure that the role of treasurer doesn't become too burdensome and that knowledge of the church's finances doesn't rest solely with one individual.

I hope to be running a July report out of Icon soon, and making sure the figures, etc. match the July report from the old system. There's A LOT of data entry that's required to set up Icon, but I'll use PennDOT's old adage: "temporary inconvenience, permanent improvement."

Pledge payments usually slow to a trickle over the summer, and this year has been no exception. To help the church avoid cash flow challenges, please stay on track with your pledge payments. If you still owe anything on last fiscal year's pledge, I'll cheerfully accept it. ③

New UUA President

New President of UUA Was Elected June 27 at General Assembly



Rev. Peter Morales, senior minister of Jefferson Unitarian Church in Golden, CO, was elected to be the eighth president of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations (UUA) at the Association's General Assembly (GA) in Salt Lake City. Speaking of his aspirations for Unitarian Universalism, Rev. Morales said, "I want to grow our faith, to reach all those people who are looking for non-dogmatic, liberal religious community. I look forward to working with partners in many other progressive and justice-seeking religious groups. There are tremendous issues that we'll be facing in the coming years and we're going to need one another." Rev. Morales is the first Latino to be elected president of the UUA. He succeeds Rev. William Sinkford, who was the first African American to lead a historically white denomination in the United States.

Global Connections: Exciting Uganda News!

There are so many things happening so fast in Uganda that it is quite amazing:

- The Buy a Brick fundraising goal has been raised from \$23,000 to \$30,000 because of the promise of some large contributions coming in for the new classroom building
- A high school student in Ohio has refurbished and donated five complete PCs which he is shipping to Uganda via some contacts he has who are going to Tanzania. The school may be able to teach computer classes to the public to help pay for the electricity to power the computers
- A woman from the Sunnyhill Church visited the school and took some photos of the building project while on business in Kampala last month
- With a recently purchased webcam, Hanan has learned how to do three-way live video chats on his computer, with a fifth grade class in Tampa and Rev. Waun
- Rev. Waun has five volunteers committed to going on the next trip in January
- The volunteers will set up a Nurse's Office at the school and help to furnish it with used medical equipment they are collecting to take with them
- More than 200 of the Ugandan students now have American sponsors.
